Show and Tell:

Charlie L brought in a rasp asp with ruby eyes, made from a farrier's rasp, Wes brought in a spear head and draw knife, both made from farrier's rasps, and a knife and fork made from wrenches. Neil brought in a horse shoe and heart puzzle, Aaron brought 2 very nice pairs of tongs, Chris brought in an axe head, to be used as the top of a walking stick, made from a Polanski axe, originally used for fighting forest fires. Lashen brought in 3 knives, 2 short and one long, with black walnut handles, and a heron head walking stick. Brody brought a book of ideas. Neil spoke about a video of a guy in Montana who has made 2 wagons for hauling boraxthe 20 mule team type. The iron work started as 34 x 3 inch bar stock, and was forged and forge welded as needed. Incidentally, there are only 18 mules in a 20 mule team- apparently the front two animals are horses, because horses will do what they are directed to do.


About the Artist:








































Examples of power hammer swages (courtesy of David Ponsler)





Knife Maker's Vise

Materials:

A: 1 4" x 4" x 0.25" plate of steel


B: 2 1" x 2" x 0.25" plate of steel

C: 1 Black pipe: 3.5" OD (3.000" ID)

D: 1 4.0" OD (3.585" ID)


E: 3 1/2" x 13 cap-head bolts

F: 3 1/2" x 13 nuts




Vise Liner


From scrap hard wood, shape a cylinder that slips into the 6" pipe. Cut it in half so that when the bolts are withdrawn, there is a 3/8" to 1/2" gap between the wood blocks. Inset a washer in the block under the ends of the bolts.



Base



Drill 0.5" holes in each corner. Weld the B plates as shown, along one edge and 1.75" apart.



Drill 2 0.5" holes 3/4" from each end of the 6" long pipe. Weld a nut over one and thread the other. Cut a 1.5" x 0.5" slot on the end with the nut.

Mount and use:


Slip the blocks into the long pipe and the long pipe into the short pipe. Insert a knife (tang or blade) either length-wise between the blocks or cross-wise in the slots. Tighten the bolts on the long pipe to lock the knife and then rotate the pipe as needed in the shorter pipe. Lock the rotation with the bolt on the shorter pipe. Bolt the whole assembly to a table using the holes in the base or fabricate a piece of angle-iron with matching holds for a vise-mount.


Octopus Coat Hooks S.A.Bloom




Using 1/2" square stock, prepare 8 pieces 5" long & 1 piece 2" long.
 Using the 5" stock, forge the terminal 3" into a gradual taper apprx.
 8" long. Round the taper & curl the end.




2. Bundle the 8 arms around the 2" piece, arc-weld the arms together, then forge weld into a single mass. Forge the head into a cylinder with a domed end.





 Using a hemispheric swage block, dish the head slightly. Form an eye with a round eye punch & add a horizontal pupil slit.

4. Shape the laterial rear arms & a center rear arm into attachment points. Shape the rest into protruding hooks (a torch will help).



Use 3" for 1/4" stock => towel racks
Use 4" for 3/8" stock => hat racks
Use 6" for 3/4" stock => hernia

Uses:
key ring holders, business
card display/holder, ferric sushi
